Case Status: Closed / Prosecution Declined

On 04/24/2024 at approximately 1229hrs. I Deputy P. Peterson was working as the School Resource Officer at Central High School, located at 550 Warrior Way, Grand Junction, Mesa County, CO, 81504. While working as the School Resource Officer, I was advised via school radio of a large crowd in the parking lot out front of the school and that they were possibly fighting. I responded to the front parking lot and observed a large crowd of Juvenile Students. A Central High School staff member was already on site and had broken up the crowd and stated it was a verbal altercation only, and that nothing physical had happened.

School Administrators were also on scene, and knew one of the involved females to cause issues. When staff observed that female student near a vehicle they asked for the SRO's to assist as they expected the female to be confrontational. While walking to the vehicle where the female was, I heard a group of students behind me yelling "hit her Hit her". I was unsure if the group was attempting to get the female to strike the School Administrator or someone else, but they were actively trying to provoke a violent response. I turned to the group and told them to "knock it off". One of the males stated to me "what, what". I turned around to continue towards the female student, when the male stated "what, nigga". I believed this male to be attempting to provoke violence within the group of students. I approached the male and asked him what he had said. He responded "what", and I asked what he said after that, then then said "nigga". I had established probable cause for Disorderly Conduct at this point and told the male to begin walking towards the front office as my intention was not to charge him, but separate him from the crowd and alleviate the issue.

I placed my right hand on the males back to direct him towards the front doors of the school. When I placed my hand on his back, the male pulled away and stated "don't fucking touch me". It should be noted that the male kept his hands in his pockets and I did not know if he had a weapon person, but due to the male's uncooperative nature I believed it best to detain him in handcuffs for my safety and his. When he pulled away, I quickly closed the distance between us and grabbed hold of his upper collar with my right hand, and his left wrist with my left hand to gain positive control of him and not allow him to pull away from me again as I was unsure if he would attempt to fight me or try to flee. As soon as I grabbed hold of his left hand he instantly pulled his hands from his pocket and began to pull away from me again. I used a balance displacement technique to bring the male off balance and brought him to the ground in an attempt to gain positive control of the male. While on the ground he continued to pull away from me, and I was able to grab hold of his right arm with my right hand. I gave the male several verbal commands to "stop", but he continued to pull away, yelling at me to get off him. At this point Deputy M. Hand arrived to assist me and unholstered his Taser. Deputy Hand game the male a verbal warning to quit fighting or he would be tased. The male then complied and rolled onto his stomach and placed his hands behind his back to allow me to handcuff him.

The male was immediately asked if he was injured and he responded "no". I picked the male up and escorted him to the front Office. I asked the male what his name was and he stated he would not answer any questions until his grandmother arrived. I stepped out of the Office to see if Administration could Identify the student so his guardian could be contacted, and Administration identified him as . When I walked back into the Office with , his Grandmother had already called his If I could speak to her and he allowed me to use his phone to speak with his grandmother identified as cellphone. I asked on the phone and she was very . I explained the series of events and how they unfolded to was not raised to be disrespectful or confrontational with Law Enforcement. understanding. via phone to drop his attitude and stop being disrespectful. advised that he would and she advised she was on her way to the school. After getting off the phone became more cooperative. I asked if he would cooperate if I removed the Handcuffs, and he stated he would. I removed the Handcuffs, and was cooperative. explained to me that he was angry and frustrated due to seeing some of the male students being disrespectful towards female students. that I understood his feelings, but advised him that it is unwise to pull away from Law Enforcement. apologized to me and stated that he just wasn't thinking when he did that. arrived at the school and spoke with me. also apologized to me for actions and again reiterated that not having any previous Law Enforcement issues and no other major issues at School. I was not raised to act that way. Due to declined to charge with Disorderly Conduct.

was suspended from school for the remainder of the day by School Administration, and released to the custody of his

It should be noted that I was wearing my department-issued Axon Body Worn Camera (S/N: X60333921) during this contact. The camera completed an automatic function check upon startup at the beginning of my shift, there were no errors during the function check, and the camera was functioning normally. The following is not verbatim, but my recollection of events and statements during the contact.

On April 24, 2024, at approximately 1210 hours, I, Deputy Hand, was working as assigned SRO at Central High School located at 550 Warrior Way in Mesa County, Colorado I was notified by an unknown student there was a large fight going on in the parking lot of Central High School. I proceeded outside with Deputy Peterson. Interim Assistant Principal Vern McGee (DOB 06/13/64) was also present and walking outside to address the fight.

When we arrived outside there was a large group of students at the east end of the school across from the weight room. It appeared that the fight had broken up but there was still some back-and-forth verbal argument going on between two groups of students. Teachers and school administrators also began showing up. I saw Clint Trujillo (DOB 03/10/72), who is the wrestling coach and a Central High Staff member. I went to find out what was going on, Clint informed me it was a verbal altercation between two groups and nothing physical. As staff and administrators were telling students to leave the area and go to class, I could hear the two groups of students continue yelling at each other. I observed a black pickup truck bearing CO PN had pulled past the crowd of students and stopped almost directly in front of the school. I observed a male later identified as jump into this black pickup after standing at the door for a while.

I started to head back inside the building as I believed the incident was under control. I heard from an unknown person, "Swing on her ." I turned around and observed Deputy Peterson in a physical struggle with a male student later identified as swing on her , Deputy Peterson and were on the ground, and Deputy Peterson was behind . I ran over to assist Deputy Peterson and I observed Deputy Peterson was continuing to struggle with T19C16678) activated and pointed at the upper chest of T19C16678. I also began giving loud verbal commands to to lay flat on his . I drew my agency-issued Taser 10 (S/N stomach, I had to repeat these commands at least twice before complied. I finally rolled over onto his stomach and Deputy Peterson was able to detain him in handcuffs. As Deputy Peterson was attempting to detain a crowd was surrounding both of us and several students were video recording the incident on their cell phones. I heard Assistant Principal Shauna Hobbs (DOB 06/24/70) telling this group of students to leave the area multiple times. One female student, later identified as was being verbally uncooperative and saying something along the lines of It's my right. I can record according to the law I can be here. I observed continued to move into an unsafe distance between me and Deputy Peterson while continuing to stir up the crowd. I yelled at , "Unless you want to be charged with obstruction you will get out of my scene right now, get out of my scene all y'all." began dispersing away from where myself and Deputy Peterson were. Deputy Peterson finished Students including detaining . I could hear other students yelling vulgarities and racial slurs toward me and Deputy Peterson. Deputy Peterson began inside the school and I turned around and saw a male student I recognized as who was one of the students yelling yulgarities and racial slurs at us. I turned around and addressed to come here. said let's go to the office and call Grandpa. something along the lines of I am not fucking going anywhere with you. I said come said yeah let's go call Grandpa then.

dating back to last school year and it has been confrontational most of the time. I have a history with live with their Grandfather however, their mother is active in their lives. I was told by a while back he has custody of the children and they live with him most of the time. After an issue at the beginning of the year where was involved in a fight and became very disruptive and was walking back and forth in front of the school yelling vulgarities and racial slurs. also appeared to be calling other people to come to the school to assault the individual who he had been in a fight with. responded to the school to pick up and he lengthy conversation about the situation during this discussion provided me his personal cell number and asked if up and he and I had a disrespectful, rude, or just amped up at me, the staff, another student whatever the situation may be to call him and he will come to get him and sort out the situation. Went on to explain that he would hold accountable for his actions and said he would hold anyone else accountable if they were in the wrong. So the information above regarding was also true about and I have not had any issues in the past

before this incident. I also had lengthy conversations with regarding

details I was informed was on the phone and wanted to talk to me. I spoke to and explained I did yell at was only taken to the office in keeping with the agreement between , and myself earlier in the year. reported he was only trying to help give me information about what happened when I made him go to the office. When I explained the situation as I observed it told me she would handle behavior at home. also arrived and I and back to class. went to talk to had a similar conversation with him and I sent and she was released to her home. I went back into the office and was approached by a female who identified herself as Grandmother. and his Grandmother apologized for behavior and said thank you to Deputy Peterson and I for keeping safe. Grandmother left the school. This concluded my involvement in this incident.

## (S2243 - 05.09.24 - 1237 HRS) Deputy Peterson Supplemental Report - Provided by Deputy Peterson's Legal Counsel on 05-08-24

I, Phillip Wayne Peterson, am submitting this supplemental statement in reference to the incident that occurred on April 24, 2024 at Central High School. This statement is intended to serve as a supplement to my previously submitted report.

When I placed my right arm around the male's shoulder, my purpose was to pull him close to me in order to prevent him from continuing to pull away from me. At no point in time did I place my arm around his neck. Rather, I placed my arm on his shoulder and upper torso with the intent to keep my body weight on top of him as he was still actively pushing against me and trying to get up off the ground. I was very cognizant of the fact that this was a juvenile that I was dealing with, and I was taking precautions to not cause injury or any pain to the male. The male did not follow my command to "stop" and continued to attempt to get up. I kept my arm around his upper torso only to keep balance on top of the male and keep him on the ground. I was also cognizant of the positioning of my arm and tried to readjust my positioning when I felt my arm was getting too close to the male's neck region at one point. I never applied any pressure to the male's neck. I did not under any circumstances try to restrict or impede his breathing in any way.

I asked the male several times after the incident if he was injured, as his safety and well-being were of primary concern to me. He stated he was not injured and declined to be seen by EMS. I asked him if he would agree to the school nurse checking on him as a precaution, and he agreed to that. The school nurse came and briefly examined him in my presence, and did not observe any injuries. At no point in time did the male state he could not breathe or that he was in pain.

On April 24, 2024, at approximately 1225hrs, at Central High School (CHS), two of our deputies were involved in a use of force incident with a juvenile CHS student. The incident did not result in serious bodily injury to any person. Our case number for this incident is 24-13598. The two involved deputies, both School Resource Officers, are Deputy Phillip Peterson and Deputy Michael Hand.

Almost immediately, we received complaints about our deputies' conduct in this incident. This incident has since continued to draw a significant amount of public attention.

In our initial administrative response to the complaint, we have become concerned this incident needs to be criminally investigated and I do not believe it is in the best interest of the Mesa County Community, for our office to conduct this investigation.

I respectfully request that you activate the 21st Judicial District Critical Incident Response Team to conduct the criminal investigation.

Incident with SRO at CHS on 4/24/24
The incident occurred during lunch in front of the building.

Conversations occurred between Deputy Hand and grandpa, who has custody of Deputy Hand and Grandpa had a previous agreement that Deputy Hand would escort his grandson ( to the front office anytime became defiant or misbehaved. When (Grandpa) arrived at CHS, he immediately went into the SRO office, he spoke to Deputy Hand who explained why was escorted into the SRO office. Deputy Hand and discussed the situation with , and asked if he understood why Deputy Hand had escorted him to the office, said yes, and then was released to return to class. was not hostile nor upset by Deputy Hand's actions at that time. After finished his discussion with Deputy Hand he came to my office to get where continued to scream obscenities and make accusations about the Deptuties being racist and police brutality, etc. multiple times to stop and to calm down. He took home with him. At no time did discuss with me that he was upset or agree with Next, I had a conversation with was the one who was grandma ( cuffed and taken to the ground by Deputy Peterson). grandma was in full agreement with how the situation was handled. She stated to that his behavior was unacceptable, and would not be tolerated. When and Grandma left the building, went over to both deputies apologized, and shook their hands.

#### On 4/25/24

and his grandma came into the main office to talk to myself and Ryan Whittington to see if there was anything needed to do before returning to class. During that conversation, Grandma stated that she had watched a few of the videos, and although it was hard to watch being taken down to the ground and handcuffed, it was fault. Grandma continued to say had no business calling a Sherriff a "niggar", disobeying what he was asked to do, and taunting students to fight. Grandma also stated, that she blamed the children for all of this blowing up, and they had no business saying this was racially motivated, and wasn't even Hispanic. After that Grandpa left, and went back to class.

#### Hello!

I am sorry for the group email, but I wanted to share some salient points about an incident that happened at lunch on our Campus on Wednesday. I would like to give context, but also give support for our SROs who acted in complete integrity according to their training in crowd management.

1--the incident that had been brewing between 2 female students had finally landed in the front of the school in the fire lane. By this time, both girls had enlisted the support of their friends, their boyfriends, and their brothers. Each female had their boyfriends and their brothers also arguing.

2-the argument was heated and many racial slurs on both sides were thrown out. There has been some accusations that this fight was about race, but it was quite the contrary. There were white and hispanic students on both sides of the argument, so there was no clear "white" side or "brown side" as has been alleged by parents.

3--the argument between the girls was based on social media insults to and about each other, including derogatory marks about how each of them looked or even about their mothers. It was not kind by any means, but could have been resolved with restorative justice had this been brought to counselors or administrators.

4-there were no punches thrown, but there was an alleged shove between a girl on one side (the 11th grader) and the boyfriend's brother of the other girl (the 9th grader.)

5-Once Mrs. Hobbs and our SRO's broke up the crowd gathering and sent people into the building, some witnesses told their stories, including the 9th and 11th grade girls.

There had been a truck that drove up driven by the girlfriend of the boy who allegedly shoved the 9th grade girl. The 9th grade girl's boyfriend, his brother, his girlfriend, and his little brother (who is the boyfriend of the 9th grade girl in the conflict.)

6-Mrs. Hobbs tried to bring in the 9th grade girl and her friend while the car load drove away, and at this point enlisted the help of the SROs. The friends/boyfriend/brother of the 11th grade girl in the fight began to yell at the SROs for breaking it up and began to use profanity and racial slurs toward the SROs. The SROs then had to turn their attention to this crowd forming and who was apparently pretty hostile at this point. One crowd even threatened to "kick his ass" and "his" is meaning the SRO. One of the most vocal 11th grade boys even shoulder checked and showed aggression toward our SRO.

7-At this point, our SRO attempted to contain this student and take him to the office. The student continued yelling and resisted the officer. The officer then had to throw him to the ground to handcuff him to take him to the office. At this point, the crowd became even more incensed and tried to crowd the officer who was handcuffing the student. The other officer

had to protect his partner and pulled out his taser and threatened students who were encroaching. Students finally started to back off and realized that they needed to calm down.

8-The SROs then brought in two 11th grade boys, the boyfriend and the brother of the 11th grade girl in the argument, and called both parents and grandparents. Mrs. Hobbs called the parents of the 9th grade girl and her friend. None of the parents or grandparents were happy about the situation, but all understood that their students should not have challenged the authority of the SROs and were in the wrong. There had been no punches thrown, so students were spoken to and returned to class.

9-At 7:00 PM, the parents of a friend of the 11th grade girl (who wasn't even there) and the 2 girls came into the office to speak with Mrs. Arledge and Mrs. Hobbs to show the video and file a complaint against the officers. We watched the video, and we explained that the officers were acting in accordance with their training, but that we were not trained officers so probably did not have all of the answers they were looking for. They wanted an investigation opened, and we told them that they would have to speak to the sheriff's office about that because law enforcement is not our jurisdiction, but that we were in support of our SROs. They said they planned to do that, and I believe they did.

10-The 11th grade girl also found and showed us a photo of the 11th grade boy who shoved her holding a gun. We encouraged her to generate a Safe2Tell in case we couldn't get reach law enforcement. This girl did generate 2 of those reports, but there was no threat in the Instagram post, only a picture of the student with a gun. I asked Mr. Milholland to call Tim Leon and Marv DiPilato. Mr. Milholland did that and spoke with Tim Leon. We made a plan to meet in the morning at 7:00 AM and not to allow the young man with the gun or his brother on campus while we completed a threat assessment.

11-Mike Hand, one of our SROs, also made sure that the house of the young man with the picture of the gum was searched that evening. The gun was actually a BB gun, but it was a threatening picture, and we did not know if the student had the gun facsimile on campus earlier that day.

12-At 7 AM this morning, we all discussed the situation together: Marv DiPilato, Jason Talley, Tracy Arledge, Josh King, Brandon Milholland, Ryan Whittington, Shauna Hobbs, Tim Leon, Mike Hand, Phil Peterson. We were all on the same page and made a plan to gather as many witness statements as possible, but the boys and girls who argued on nocontact contracts, and to begin the threat assessment of the young man with the gun facsimile. This plan was carried out by CHS administration and Jason Talley.

I would like to write in support of our SROs. They acted entirely from the stance of protecting our staff and students from harm, and were trying to prevent the crowd from getting out of hand. Mrs. Hobbs asked for their assistance in bringing the girls in, but the boys in the crowd took this situation to a different level. The heated exchanges necessitated the SROs to try to calm them down, and the boys who were belligerent and non-compliant posed an additional threat to the officers.

Our SROs have done an incredible job at building rapport with students and creating a tangible presence in our building. We are lucky to have them in our corner, and we all feel safer with them there. I admire their courage and dedication to our school.

Any of the CHS administrators will be happy to speak or answer questions about this incident, and we can hopefully provide clarity for any interested parties. I know that there are several angles of the videos of the incident between the officer and the student, and some angles show more clearly than others that the boy who was handcuffed was not complying with the officer's request to go to the office.

Mesa County Sheriff's Office Policy Manual

## **Body-Worn Camera**

#### **421.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE**

This policy provides standards for the use of Body-Worn Camera (BWC) recording devices by members of this Office while in the performance of their duties. BWC recording devices include all recording systems, whether body-worn, hand-held or integrated into portable equipment.

This policy does not apply to audio/video recordings of interviews or interrogations conducted in designated rooms at any Mesa County Sheriff's Office facility where recording devices are provided, authorized undercover operations, wiretaps, or eavesdropping (concealed listening devices).

#### **421.2 POLICY**

The Mesa County Sheriff's Office will provide authorized members of the agency with Body-Worn Camera recording devices to capture both the audio and video of contacts between an agency peace officer and the public. The use of Body-Worn Camera recording devices is intended to enhance the mission of the Office by accurately capturing contacts between members of the Office and the public (CRS § 24-31-902).

#### **421.3 DEFINITIONS**

**Contact(s)** - An interaction with an individual whether or not the person is in a motor vehicle, whether consensual or nonconsensual, for the purpose of enforcing the law or investigating possible violations of the law. Contact(s) do not include routine interactions with the public at the point of entry or exit from a controlled area. (CRS 24-31-901)

Data - The video/audio file created and captured by the Body-Worn Camera hardware.

**Download -** Retrieving, transferring, and/or viewing Data from a storage location that has already been removed from the Body-Worn Camera hardware.

**Metadata** - Data used to describe or provide information about the downloaded Body-Worn Camera audio and video.

**Peace Officer** - Any person employed by a political subdivision of the state required to be certified by the P.O.S.T. board pursuant to section 16-2.5.102 and any noncertified deputy sheriff as described in section 16-2.5-103(2). (CRS 24-31-901)

**Physical Force** - The application of physical techniques or tactics, chemical agents, or weapons to another person. (CRS 24-31-901)

**System Administrator** - The individual designated by the Sheriff to have oversight of the Body-Worn Camera program. This will include the responsibility of the operation and administration of the support systems and equipment.

**Tagging Data** - Adding metadata to data that has been captured by the Body-Worn Camera hardware.

Mesa County Sheriff's Office Policy Manual

#### Body-Worn Camera

**Tamper** - To intentionally damage, disable, dislodge, or obstruct the sight or sound or otherwise impair the functionality of the Body-Worn Camera or to intentionally damage, delete, or fail to download some or all portions of the video and audio. (CRS 24-31-901)

**Upload -** Removing all data from the Body-Worn Camera hardware and transferring it to a long-term storage location.

#### 421.4 AGENCY MEMBER PRIVACY EXPECTATION

All recordings made by agency members on any office-issued Body-Worn Camera device at any time, and any recording made while acting in an official capacity shall remain the property of the Office. Agency members shall have no expectation of privacy or ownership interest in the content of these recordings.

#### 421.5 MEMBER RESPONSIBILITIES

Prior to going into service, each uniformed member will be responsible for making sure that the member is equipped with a portable recorder issued by the Office, and that the recorder is in good working order. If the recorder is not in working order or the member becomes aware of a malfunction at any time, the member shall promptly report the failure to the member's supervisor and obtain a functioning device as soon as reasonably practicable. Uniformed members should wear the recorder in a conspicuous manner or otherwise notify persons that they are being recorded, whenever reasonably practicable.

Unless working undercover, any member assigned to a non-uniformed position should wear and activate a body-worn camera when responding to a call, during a welfare check except for motorist assist, and while interacting with the public or entering into a premises with the purpose of enforcing the law or investigating possible violations of the law (CRS § 24-31-902). Unless conducting a lawful recording in an authorized undercover capacity, non-uniformed members should wear the recorder in a conspicuous manner when in use or otherwise notify persons that they are being recorded, whenever reasonably practicable.

When using a recorder, the assigned member shall record the member's name, MCSO identification number, and the current date and time at the beginning and the end of the shift or other period of use, regardless of whether any activity was recorded. This procedure is not required when the recording device and related software captures the user's unique identification and the date and time of each recording.

Members should document the existence of a recording in any report or other official record of the contact, including any instance where the recorder malfunctioned or the member deactivated the recording. Members should include the reason for deactivation.

#### 421.6 ACTIVATION OF THE BODY-WORN CAMERA (CRS 24-21-902)

All agency members required to wear a Body-Worn Camera recording device will activate the camera immediately upon the following:

Mesa County Sheriff's Office Policy Manual

#### Body-Worn Camera

- When arriving at a call for service, received through central dispatch or self-dispatched (this does not include calls handled by phone)..
- Responding to assist another officer on a call for service.
- Any self-initiated contact with a member of the public, for the purpose of enforcing the law or investigating possible violations of the law.
- Any interview or interrogation conducted at a location other recording devices are not available.
- All traffic contacts.
- All welfare checks.
- Any other time the deputy feels the recording may transition to a contact, as previously defined.

Agency members are not required to wear or activate a Body-Worn Camera if they are working in an undercover capacity.

If an agency member fails to activate his/her Body-Worn Camera as required or discovers the equipment became inoperable during a contact, the agency member will immediately notify the shift supervisor and document why the activation did not occur and/or when it was discovered the Body-Worn Camera was inoperable. The report should include the deputy's functionality check of the Body-Worn Camera at the beginning of the shift.

#### 421.6.1 SURREPTITIOUS USE OF THE BODY-WORN CAMERA

Colorado law permits an individual to surreptitiously record any conversation in which one party to the conversation has given his/her permission (CRS § 18-9-303).

Members may surreptitiously record any conversation during the course of a criminal investigation in which the member reasonably believes that such a recording will be lawful and beneficial to the investigation.

Members shall not surreptitiously record another office member without a court order unless lawfully authorized by the Sheriff or the authorized designee.

#### 421.6.2 EXPLOSIVE DEVICE

Body-worn cameras emit radio waves that could trigger an explosive device. Therefore, these devices should not be used where an explosive device may be present.

#### 421.6.3 CESSATION OF RECORDING (CRS 24-31-902)

Once activated, the Body-Worn Camera recording device should remain on continuously until the agency member reasonably believes that his/her direct participation in the incident is complete or the situation no longer fits the criteria for activation. Recording may be stopped to avoid recording personal information that is not case related; when working on an unrelated assignment; when

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there is a long break in the incident or contact that is not related to the initial incident; and during administrative, tactical, and management discussions.

Agency members will not record patients while receiving medical or psychological evaluations by a clinician or similar professional, or during treatment, while at a medical facility.

#### 421.7 COURT SERVICES - BODY-WORN CAMERA REQUIREMENTS (CRS 24-31-902)

Deputies assigned to Court Services are expected to meet the requirements in section 421.6 of this policy. They are exempt from activating his/her Body-Worn Camera recording device when assigned to the courthouse entry/exit point or while inside of a courtroom.

## 421.8 DETENTION FACILITY - BODY-WORN CAMERA REQUIREMENTS (CRS 24-31-902(1) (A)(II)(D)

Detention Deputies are required to utilize a Body-Worn Camera recording device when they are performing a task in which there is the potential that force will be used, including cell extractions and restraint devices.

Deputies assigned to the Detention Facility shall download, label, tag their Body-Worn Camera video by the End Of Shift (EOS) of their first shift back to work. If a pre-planned FMLA or VAC is scheduled for the following shift, the Deputy shall ensure their Body-Worn Camera video is labeled before the end of their final shift and before FMLA or VAC. If a significant event or critical incident occurs during the shift, the Deputy shall ensure the video is labeled properly before the end of their current shift.

#### 421.9 PROHIBITED USE BODY-WORN CAMERA

Members are prohibited from using office-issued Body-Worn Camera for personal use and are prohibited from making personal copies of recordings created while on-duty or while acting in their official capacity.

Members are also prohibited from retaining recordings of activities or information obtained while on-duty. Members shall not duplicate or distribute recordings.

Agency members are not authorized to use a personally owned Body-Worn Camera recording device for office-related activities.

Recordings shall not be used by any member for the purpose of embarrassment, harassment, or ridicule.

#### 421.10 IDENTIFICATION AND PRESERVATION OF RECORDINGS

To assist with identifying and preserving data and recordings, members will download, tag, and mark all recorded data in accordance with standard procedures and document the existence of the recording in any related case report or incident report.

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## 421.11 TAMPERING WITH OR FAILING TO ACTIVATE THE BODY-WORN CAMERA (CRS 24-31-902(III)

If an agency member fails to activate his/her Body-Worn Camera when required, tampers with the Body-Worn Camera recorded footage, and/or tampers with the operation of the camera, there is a permissive inference in any investigation or legal proceeding, excluding criminal proceedings against the peace officer, that the missing footage would have reflected misconduct by the officer and any statements sought to be introduced in a prosecution through the peace officer related to the incident that was not recorded due to the peace officer failure to activate or reactivate the Body-Worn Camera as required, or is the statement was not recorded by other means a rebuttable presumption of inadmissibility.

This standard does not apply if the Body-Worn Camera was not activated due to a malfunction and the agency member was not aware of the malfunction, or was unable to rectify it prior to the incident, provided the agency members documentation shows the agency member checked the functionality of the Body-Worn Camera at the beginning of their shift.

If the results of an internal investigation finds that an agency member intentionally failed to activate their Body-Worn Camera or tampered with the camera's footage or operation, except as permitted in section 422.6.3 of this policy, the agency shall impose discipline up to and including termination.

If the internal investigation findings are that the agency member intentionally failed to activate their Body-Worn Camera or tampered with the camera's footage or operation, with the intent to conceal unlawful or inappropriate actions or obstruct justice, the P.O.S.T. Board shall suspend the peace officers certification for a period of not less than one year and the suspension may only be lifted within the period of the suspension if the peace officer is exonerated by a court.

If the incident investigated by internal affairs resulted in the death of a civilian and the findings are that the agency member failed to activate their Body-Worn Camera or tampered with the camera's footage or operation, with the intent to conceal unlawful or inappropriate actions or obstruct justice, the P.O.S.T. Board shall permanently revoke the peace officer's certification and the revocation may only be overturned if the peace officer is exonerated by a court.

#### 421.12 RETENTION OF RECORDINGS

The agency will retain all data recovered by a Body-Worn Camera recording device based on the following retention schedule.

#### 421.12.1 RELEASE OF BODY WORN CAMERA RECORDINGS

Requests for the release of Body-Worn Camera recordings shall be processed in accordance with the Colorado Criminal Justice Records Act (CRS 24-72-301 to 309) and the Law Enforcement Integrity Act (CRS 24-31-902).

#### 421.12.2 VIDEOS ASSOCIATED WITH SEALED AND EXPUNGED CASES

For all videos associated with any Sealed and Expunged case, the MCSO will follow the Court Orders as directed.

#### 421.13 REVIEW OF RECORDED MEDIA FILES

When preparing written reports, agency members should review their recordings as a resource (see the Officer-Involved Shootings and Deaths Policy for guidance in those cases). However, agency members shall not retain personal copies of recordings. Members should not use the fact that a recording was made as a reason to write a less detailed report.

Supervisors are authorized to review relevant recordings any time they are investigating alleged misconduct or reports of meritorious conduct or whenever such recordings would be beneficial in reviewing the member's performance.

Recorded files may also be reviewed:

- (a) Upon approval by a supervisor, by any member of the Office who is participating in an official investigation, such as a personnel complaint, administrative investigation, or criminal investigation.
- (b) Pursuant to lawful process or by court personnel who are otherwise authorized to review evidence in a related case.
- (c) In compliance with a public records request, if permitted, and in accordance with the Records Maintenance and Release Policy.

If a supervisor or a Subject Matter Expert in a P.O.S.T. recognized skill identifies a recording that would be beneficial for training, they must receive approval from the involved deputy's Division Commander before the video can be used as part of a training class or briefing training.

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## **Body-Worn Camera Procedure**

#### 301.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

This standard procedure provides guidelines for members of the Mesa County Sheriff's Office on the use and employee responsibilities of the Body-Worn Camera (BWC) recording devices. This includes the user responsibilities, required activation, allowed de-activation, proper mounting, uploading data, tagging metadata, the sharing and downloading of uploaded video, supervisor's responsibilities, and system administrator responsibilities.

BWC recording devices include all recording systems, whether body-worn, hand-held or integrated into portable equipment.

#### 301.2 DEFINITIONS

**Contact(s)** - An interaction with an individual whether or not the person is in a motor vehicle, whether consensual or nonconsensual, for the purpose of enforcing the law or investigating possible violations of the law. Contact(s) do not include routine interactions with the public at the point of entry or exit from a controlled area. (CRS 24-31-901)

Data - The video/audio file created and captured by the Body-Worn Camera hardware.

**Download -** Retrieving, transferring, and/or viewing Data from a storage location that has already been removed from the Body-Worn Camera hardware.

**Metadata** - Data used to describe or provide information about the downloaded Body-Worn Camera audio and video.

**Peace Officer** - Any person employed by a political subdivision of the state required to be certified by the P.O.S.T. board pursuant to section 16-2.5.102 and any noncertified deputy sheriff as described in section 16-2.5-103(2). (CRS 24-31-901)

**Physical Force** - The application of physical techniques or tactics, chemical agents, or weapons to another person. (CRS 24-31-901)

**System Administrator** - The individual designated by the Sheriff to have oversight of the Body-Worn Camera program. This will include the responsibility of the operation and administration of the support systems and equipment.

**Tagging Data** - Adding metadata to data that has been captured by the Body-Worn Camera hardware.

**Tamper** - To intentionally damage, disable, dislodge, or obstruct the sight or sound or otherwise impair the functionality of the Body-Worn Camera or to intentionally damage, delete, or fail to download some or all portions of the video and audio. (CRS 24-31-901)

**Upload -** Removing all data from the Body-Worn Camera hardware and transferring it to a long-term storage location.

#### **301.3 POLICY**

The Mesa County Sheriff's Office will provide authorized members of the agency with Body-Worn Camera recording devices to capture both the audio and video of contacts between an agency peace officer and the public. The use of Body-Worn Camera recording devices is intended to enhance the mission of the Office by accurately capturing contacts between members of the Office and the public (CRS § 24-31-902).

#### 301.4 USER RESPONSIBILITY

All Agency members required to wear a Body-Worn Camera are responsible for the following:

- The Body-Worn Camera is in proper working order at the beginning of each shift. This is accomplished by powering the camera on and allow it to complete an internal self-check. The self-check will alert the employee if it is in proper operational order.
  - o If the camera is not functioning properly the employee will immediately notify their supervisor to be issued another functional camera.
- The battery is charged, sufficient to complete the anticipated shift.
- The video storage is sufficient to complete the anticipated shift.
- Docking the Body-Worm Camera to upload data.
- Properly tagging and categorizing Metadata.
- Documenting the use of the Body-Worn Camera in their reports.
- Documenting any de-activation of the Body-Worn Camera.
- Notify any malfunction of the Body-Worn Camera as soon as practical to their supervisor
- Document and malfunction of the Body-Worn Camera, including the functionality test completed at the beginning of the shift.

#### 301.5 BODY-WORN CAMERA MOUNTING

The agency recognizes there is no location on the body that a BWC can be mounted that normal law enforcement movements will not temporarily obscure the video.

It is the responsibility of the agency member to properly mount the BWC utilizing only agency-approved mounting devices. The camera should be mounted on or near the centerline of the chest (horizontally) and the navel (vertically). The selected location of the BWC on each individual employee may be different, but the chosen location should provide the best view of what is occurring during the majority of contacts.

#### 301.6 BODY-WORN CAMERA ACTIVATION REQUIREMENTS

All agency members required to wear a Body-Worn Camera recording device will activate the camera immediately upon the following:

- When arriving at a call for service, received through central dispatch or self-dispatched.

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- Responding to assist another officer on a call for service.
- Any self-initiated contact with a member of the public, for the purpose of enforcing the law or investigating possible violations of the law.
- Any interview or interrogation conducted at a location other recording devices are not available.
  - This does not include interviews conducted for obtaining intelligence.
- All traffic contacts.
- All welfare checks on pedestrians or motor vehicles.
- Entering a premises for the purposes of enforcing the law or in response to a call for service
- Any other time the deputy feels the recording may transition to a contact, as previously defined.

#### 301.7 BODY-WORN CAMERA DE-ACTIVATION

Once activated, the Body-Worn Camera recording device should remain on continuously until the agency member reasonably believes that his/her direct participation in the incident is complete or the situation no longer fits the criteria for activation. Recording may be stopped for the following reasons:

- To avoid recording personal information that is not case related.
- When working on an unrelated assignment.
- When there is a long break in the incident.
- When contacting another individual that is not related to the initial incident.
- During administrative, tactical, and management discussions.
- AND, Civilians are not present.

Agency members will not record patients while receiving medical or psychological evaluations by a clinician or similar professional, or during treatment, while at a medical facility.

#### 301.8 UPLOADING, TAGGING, AND/OR REVIEWING DATA

Employees are required to upload videos within 24 hours of the incident/contact unless approved by a supervisor. This is completed by docking the BWC in any agency Docking Station. The uploading process can be interrupted if the employee is required to respond to any other call for service.

 Although the camera does have the ability to remotely download video, this process should only be utilized when the Agency Administration or the Investigations Unit needs the video immediately.

It is the employee's responsibility to properly "tag" the metadata of the videos they produce. This includes completing the ID, Title, and Category.

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The ID must be tagged in the following format: MCSO and the Incident/Case Number (ex. **MCSO 21-1234**)

The Title will be left to the discretion of the uploading employee. It is recommended the Title contain a brief description of the contents of the video.

The Category will be selected from the drop-down list and the selected category must match the level of the highest crime or appropriate incident.

Employees are allowed to review their videos when completing their reports or preparing for court. The video is not a replacement for a report.

Employees have the ability to review their videos they produce to prepare a report or to prepare for court. Each time the video is reviewed the employee is required to annotate the reason for accessing the video. The annotation is added to the "Post Note" section of the video data.

Deputies assigned to the Detention Facility shall download, label, tag their Body-Worn Camera video by the End Of Shift (EOS) of their first shift back to work. If a pre-planned FMLA or VAC is scheduled for the following shift, the Deputy shall ensure their Body-Worn Camera video is labeled before the end of their final shift and before FMLA or VAC. If a significant event or critical incident occurs during the shift, the Deputy shall ensure the video is labeled properly before the end of their current shift.

#### 301.9 SHARING OR DOWNLOADING BODY-WORN CAMERA DATA

Supervisors and/or the Video Evidence Technician are the only authorized individuals who can share downloaded videos.

Supervisors and/or certified Instructors can download and utilize videos for the purpose of debriefing a critical incident and/or training. Prior to downloading the video, the affected Division Commander must approve the use of video. Consideration must be given to employee who may appear in the video and the scrutiny they may receive.

#### 301.10 SUPERVISORY RESPONSIBILITY/AUDITS

Supervisors shall review data of at least two Body-Worn Camera events per month of each employee assigned directly under their command. Supervisors shall ensure employees are complying with activation procedures as outlined in the policy. Each time the video is reviewed the Supervisor is required to annotate the reason for accessing the video. The annotation is added to the "Post Note" section of the video data.

Supervisors may review the data to evaluate the performance of a subordinate or to investigate allegations of misconduct.

#### 301.11 SYSTEM ADMINISTRATOR(S)

The System Administrator(s) are responsible maintenance updates, trouble-shooting cameras and Evidence.com, and will work with the Mesa County IT Department to ensure the proper operation

SOP for Policy 421 Body-Worn-Camera (BWC)

## Storage, check out, docking

Uniformed Detention staff will be assigned a BWC. The BWCs will be stored on the docking stations located in the walk-through area in front of the Programs office and in the Sergeant's office. Staff will retrieve their assigned BWC at the beginning of their shift and will be required to place the BWC on the docking station at the end of each shift. This will allow for the BWC to charge, download any video, and upload any necessary program updates.

## **BWC Mounting**

The agency recognizes there is no location on the body where a BWC can be mounted that normal law enforcement movements will not temporarily obscure the video.

It is the responsibility of the agency member to properly mount the BWC utilizing only agency-approved mounting devices. The camera should be mounted on or near the centerline of the chest (horizontally) and the navel (vertically). The selected location of the BWC on each individual employee may be different, but the chosen location should provide the best view of what is occurring during the majority of contacts.

Depending on the situation, the BWC can also be utilized with the GoPro stick mounting system or may be used as a handheld camera.

## **BWC** use

Uniformed staff will be required to wear a BWC when on duty.

A BWC will be used for all planned events when the use of force is a reasonably foreseeable possible outcome and when staff is contacting an inmate in an area that the Jail camera system does not cover. (For example; when in an inmate's cell)

During a cell extraction, all members of the extraction team will activate their BWC. One staff member will be assigned to provide an overview of the incident. This BWC will be placed on a GoPro stick or can be handheld and will be held in such a way to provide an overview or larger view of the incident.

Additionally, Detention Staff can activate the BWC anytime they feel it is necessary.

## **Inmate transports**

A BWC will be worn during all inmate transports and the BWC recording device should remain on continuously except while the inmate is receiving medical or psychological evaluations by a clinician or similar professional, or during treatment, while at a medical facility. The BWC should be muted and turned away from the inmate while receiving treatment or evaluation. Immediately, upon the completion of the treatment or evaluation, the BWC will be returned to full functioning mode.

A medical incident report will need to be completed for inmate medical transports. The narrative will need to include the reason for transport, the location the inmate was taken, and the name of the deputy taking the transport.

## **Documentation and Saving Video**

Incident reports will need to be completed with all saved videos. When more than one BWC is recording during an incident, staff will label the video under the primary incident report number

A security incident report will need to be completed when the BWC is used to record an inmate or incident.

Uploading of the video will occur automatically when the BWC is returned to the docking station.

Labeling of the video will be required using the evidence.com software and should be completed during the same shift the video was recorded. If the deputy is unable to complete the labeling of the video prior to the end of their shift, they are required to notify the shift supervisor.

When labeling the video, ID is: MCDF and the incident #. TITLE is: inmate name and brief description (example: Uncooperative, cell extraction...) and appropriate category is selected.

The category will be selected from the following list and will be retained as set by the Colorado Sheriff's Records Retention Schedule.

# Mesa County Justice Center Axon Body-Worn-Camera SOP for Policy 421 and Procedure 301 Body-Worn-Cameras (BWC)

When assigned to uniformed duty at the Mesa County Justice Center and/or on prisoner transport, in addition to the provisions of Policy 421 and Procedure 301, the following Standard Operating Procedures will apply regarding the use of Body-Worn-Camera recording devices inside courtrooms, while on juvenile and adult inmate transports, and during inmate medical transports.

BWC recording devices will be activated during any law enforcement action contact with any citizen inside of or on the grounds of the Justice Center.

#### **USE IN COURTROOMS**

BWC recording devices will be activated when entering any courtroom at the request of the Court/Judge for an ordered remand to jail or for any other type of arrest or law enforcement action, such as restoring order and/or removing disruptive citizens from a courtroom.

#### **PROBATIONS**

BWC recording devices will be activated when entering Probations to make any Probations or warrant arrest or when requested by Probations to remove any disorderly citizen(s) or to take any type of law enforcement action.

#### LONG DISTANCE TRANSPORTS

BWC recording devices will be activated by both transport deputies during chain-up of inmates and loading them into the transport vehicle. The BWC's may be turned off during the long-distance transport but must be reactivated if needing to take any type of law enforcement action with the inmates during the trip.

BWC's will be activated at the destination during the removal of the inmates from the transport vehicle and until their custody is released to the receiving agency, unless the use of BWC's for even this purpose is strictly prohibited by that agency (i.e. DOC). Adhere to the rules for that agency and determine a balance between when the BWC should be on and when it shouldn't.

One incident number will be used for the entire transport trip to document and save all BWC video segments from the transport deputies.

#### JUVENILE TRANSPORTS FROM DYC

Body-worn camera recording devices will be activated by both transport deputies upon entering DYC and taking custody of a juvenile for the purpose of transporting them to the Justice Center. Cameras should be activated during any chain-up process and will remain on for the entire transport until the juvenile is placed in a court-holding cell or delivered directly to a courtroom.

Cameras will be reactivated at the time the juvenile is being re-chained for the return trip back to DYC. Cameras will remain activated for the entire transport and until the time that the juvenile is returned back to the custody of DYC.

One incident number will be used for the entire transport trip to document and save all BWC video segments from the transport deputies.

#### **MEDICAL TRANSPORTS**

Body-worn camera recording devices will be activated during the chain-up and transportation of inmates for medical appointments outside of the Mesa County Detention Facility. The BWC recording device should remain on continuously but may be de-activated, or muted and turned away, while the inmate is receiving medical or psychological evaluations by a clinician or similar professional, or during treatment while at a medical facility.

If BWC's are strictly prohibited from entering the premises (i.e. State Hospital) or being on inside the premise, adhere to the rules for that medical facility and determine a balance between when the BWC should be on and when it shouldn't.

Upon completion of the treatment or evaluation, the BWC will be returned to full functioning activation mode and remain on until the inmate is unchained and returned to the custody of the Mesa County Detention Facility.

One incident number will be used for the entire medical transport trip to document and save all BWC video segments from the transport deputies.

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## **Handcuffing and Restraints**

#### 302.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

This policy provides guidelines for the use of handcuffs and other restraints during detentions and arrests.

#### **302.2 POLICY**

The Mesa County Sheriff's Office authorizes the use of restraint devices in accordance with this policy, the Use of Force Policy and office training. Restraint devices shall not be used to punish, to display authority or as a show of force.

#### 302.3 USE OF RESTRAINTS

Only members who have successfully completed Mesa County Sheriff's Office-approved training on the use of restraint devices described in this policy are authorized to use these devices.

When deciding whether to use any restraint, deputies should carefully balance officer safety concerns with factors that include, but are not limited to:

- The circumstances or crime leading to the arrest.
- The demeanor and behavior of the arrested person.
- The age and health of the person.
- Whether the person is known to be pregnant.
- Whether the person has a hearing or speaking disability. In such cases, consideration should be given, safety permitting, to handcuffing to the front in order to allow the person to sign or write notes.
- Whether the person has any other apparent disability.

#### 302.3.1 RESTRAINT OF DETAINEES

Situations may arise where it may be reasonable to restrain an individual who may, after brief investigation, be released without arrest. Unless arrested, the use of restraints on detainees should continue only for as long as is reasonably necessary to assure the safety of deputies and others. When deciding whether to remove restraints from a detainee, deputies should continuously weigh the safety interests at hand against the continuing intrusion upon the detainee.

#### 302.3.2 RESTRAINT OF PREGNANT PERSONS

Persons who are known to be pregnant should be restrained in the least restrictive manner that is effective for officer safety. Leg irons, waist chains, or handcuffs behind the body should not be used unless the deputy has a reasonable suspicion that the person may resist, attempt escape, injure self or others, or damage property. However, the Wrap systems should never be used on persons who are known to be pregnant.

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#### Handcuffing and Restraints

No person who is in labor delivery, or recovery after delivery shall be handcuffed or restrained except in extraordinary circumstances and only when a supervisor makes an individualized determination that such restraints are necessary for the safety of the arrestee, deputies, or others.

#### 302.3.3 RESTRAINT OF JUVENILES

A juvenile under 14 years of age should not be restrained unless the juvenile is suspected of a dangerous felony or when the deputy has a reasonable suspicion that the juvenile may resist, attempt escape, injure themself, injure the deputy, or damage property.

A school resource officer or a law enforcement officer acting in the officer's official capacity on school grounds, in a school vehicle, or at a school activity or sanctioned event shall not use handcuffs on any student, unless there is a danger to themselves or others or handcuffs are used during a custodial arrest that requires transport.(CRS § 26-20-111).

#### 302.3.4 NOTIFICATIONS

Whenever a deputy transports a person with the use of restraints other than handcuffs, the deputy shall inform the jail staff upon arrival at the jail that restraints were used. This notification should include information regarding any other circumstances the deputy reasonably believes would be potential safety concerns or medical risks to the subject (e.g., prolonged struggle, extreme agitation, impaired respiration) that may have occurred prior to, or during transportation to the jail.

#### 302.4 APPLICATION OF HANDCUFFS OR PLASTIC CUFFS

Handcuffs, including temporary nylon or plastic cuffs, may be used only to restrain a person's hands to ensure officer safety.

Although recommended for most arrest situations, handcuffing is discretionary and not an absolute requirement of the Office. Deputies should consider handcuffing any person they reasonably believe warrants that degree of restraint. However, deputies should not conclude that in order to avoid risk every person should be handcuffed, regardless of the circumstances.

In most situations handcuffs should be applied with the hands behind the person's back. When feasible, handcuffs should be double-locked to prevent tightening, which may cause undue discomfort or injury to the hands or wrists.

In situations where one pair of handcuffs does not appear sufficient to restrain the individual or may cause unreasonable discomfort due to the person's size, deputies should consider alternatives, such as using an additional set of handcuffs or multiple plastic cuffs.

Handcuffs should be removed as soon as it is reasonable or after the person has been searched and is safely confined within a detention facility.

#### 302.5 APPLICATION OF SPIT HOODS/MASKS/SOCKS

Spit hoods/masks/socks are temporary protective devices designed to prevent the wearer from biting and/or transferring or transmitting fluids (saliva and mucous) to others.

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#### Handcuffing and Restraints

Spit hoods may be placed upon persons in custody when the deputy reasonably believes the person will bite or spit, either on a person or in an inappropriate place. They are generally used during application of a physical restraint, while the person is restrained, or during or after transport.

Deputies utilizing spit hoods should ensure that the spit hood is fastened properly to allow for adequate ventilation and that the restrained person can breathe normally. Deputies should provide assistance during the movement of restrained individuals due to the potential for impaired or distorted vision on the part of the individual. Deputies should avoid comingling individuals wearing spit hoods with other detainees.

Spit hoods should not be used in situations where the restrained person is bleeding profusely from the area around the mouth or nose, or if there are indications that the person has a medical condition, such as difficulty breathing or vomiting. In such cases, prompt medical care should be obtained. If the person vomits while wearing a spit hood, the spit hood should be promptly removed and discarded. Persons who have been sprayed with oleoresin capsicum (OC) spray should be thoroughly decontaminated including hair, head and clothing prior to application of a spit hood.

Those who have been placed in a spit hood should be continually monitored and shall not be left unattended until the spit hood is removed. Spit hoods shall be discarded after each use.

#### 302.6 APPLICATION OF AUXILIARY RESTRAINT DEVICES

Auxiliary restraint devices include transport belts, waist or belly chains, transportation chains, leg irons and other similar devices. Auxiliary restraint devices are intended for use during long-term restraint or transportation. They provide additional security and safety without impeding breathing, while permitting adequate movement, comfort and mobility.

Only office-authorized devices may be used. Any person in auxiliary restraints should be monitored as reasonably appears necessary.

#### 302.7 APPLICATION OF LEG RESTRAINT DEVICES

Leg restraints, including the wrap restraint system and hobbles, may be used to restrain the legs of a violent or potentially violent person when it is reasonable to do so during the course of detention, arrest or transportation. Only restraint devices approved by the Office shall be used and only by Deputies properly trained in the use of the devices.

In determining whether to use the leg restraint, deputies should consider:

- (a) Whether the deputy or others could be exposed to injury due to the assaultive or resistant behavior of a suspect.
- (b) Whether it is reasonably necessary to protect the suspect from his/her own actions (e.g., hitting his/her head against the interior of the patrol unit, running away from the arresting deputy while handcuffed, kicking at objects or deputies).
- (c) Whether it is reasonably necessary to avoid damage to property (e.g., kicking at windows of the patrol unit).

#### 302.7.1 GUIDELINES FOR USE OF LEG RESTRAINTS

When applying leg restraints the following guidelines should be followed:

- (a) If practicable, deputies should notify a supervisor of the intent to apply the leg restraint device. In all cases, a supervisor shall be notified as soon as practicable after the application of the leg restraint device.
- (b) Once applied, absent a medical or other emergency, restraints should remain in place until the deputy arrives at the jail or other facility or the person no longer reasonably appears to pose a threat.
- (c) Once secured, the person should be placed in a seated or upright position, secured with a seat belt, and shall not be placed on his/her stomach for an extended period, as this could reduce the person's ability to breathe.
- (d) The restrained person should be continually monitored by a deputy while in the leg restraint. The deputy should ensure that the person does not roll onto and remain on his/her stomach.
- (e) The deputy should look for signs of labored breathing and take appropriate steps to relieve and minimize any obvious factors contributing to this condition.
- (f) When transported by ambulance/paramedic unit, the restrained person should be accompanied by a deputy when requested by medical personnel. The transporting deputy should describe to medical personnel any unusual behaviors or other circumstances the deputy reasonably believes would be potential safety or medical risks to the subject (e.g., prolonged struggle, extreme agitation, impaired respiration).
- (g) Leg restraints will not be attached to handcuffs when the person is handcuffed behind their back in what is traditionally known as a "hog-tie" position.

NOTE: This section does not apply to Deputies conducting long distance transports, inmate medical transports, and movement of prisoners to and from court.

#### 302.8 REQUIRED DOCUMENTATION

If a person is restrained and released without an arrest, the deputy shall document the details of the detention and the need for handcuffs or other restraints.

If a person is arrested, the use of handcuffs or other restraints shall be documented in the related report:

- (a) The factors that led to the decision to use restraints.
- (b) Supervisor notification and approval of restraint use.
- (c) The types of restraint used.
- (d) The amount of time the person was restrained.
- (e) How the person was transported and the position of the person during transport.
- (f) Observations of the person's behavior and any signs of physiological problems.
- (g) Any known or suspected drug use or other medical problems.

# Handcuffing and Restraints

#### 302.9 TRAINING

Subject to available resources, the Training Coordinator should ensure that deputies receive periodic training on the proper use of handcuffs and other restraints, including:

- (a) Proper placement and fit of handcuffs and other restraint devices approved for use by the Office.
- (b) Response to complaints of pain by restrained persons.
- (c) Options for restraining those who may be pregnant without the use of leg irons, waist chains, or handcuffs behind the body.
- (d) Options for restraining amputees or those with medical conditions or other physical conditions that may be aggravated by being restrained.

# **Standards of Conduct**

# 320.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

This policy establishes standards of conduct that are consistent with the values and mission of the Mesa County Sheriff's Office and are expected of all office members. The standards contained in this policy are not intended to be an exhaustive list of requirements and prohibitions but they do identify many of the important matters concerning member conduct. In addition to the provisions of this policy, members are subject to all other provisions contained in this manual as well as any additional guidance on conduct that may be disseminated by this office or a member's supervisors.

# **320.2 POLICY**

The continued employment or appointment of every member of the Mesa County Sheriff's Office shall be based on conduct that reasonably conforms to the guidelines set forth herein. Failure to meet the guidelines set forth in this policy, whether on- or off-duty, may be cause for disciplinary action.

#### 320.3 DIRECTIVES AND ORDERS

Members shall comply with lawful directives and orders from any office supervisor or person in a position of authority, absent a reasonable and bona fide justification.

## 320.3.1 UNLAWFUL OR CONFLICTING ORDERS

Supervisors shall not knowingly issue orders or directives that, if carried out, would result in a violation of any law or office policy. Supervisors should not issue orders that conflict with any previous order without making reasonable clarification that the new order is intended to countermand the earlier order.

No member is required to obey any order that appears to be in direct conflict with any federal law, state law or local ordinance. Following a known unlawful order is not a defense and does not relieve the member from criminal or civil prosecution or administrative discipline. If the legality of an order is in doubt, the affected member shall ask the issuing supervisor to clarify the order or shall confer with a higher authority. The responsibility for refusal to obey rests with the member, who shall subsequently be required to justify the refusal.

Unless it would jeopardize the safety of any individual, members who are presented with a lawful order that is in conflict with a previous lawful order, office policy or other directive shall respectfully inform the issuing supervisor of the conflict. The issuing supervisor is responsible for either resolving the conflict or clarifying that the lawful order is intended to countermand the previous lawful order or directive, in which case the member is obliged to comply. Members who are compelled to follow a conflicting lawful order after having given the issuing supervisor the opportunity to correct the conflict, will not be held accountable for disobedience of the lawful order or directive that was initially issued.

# Standards of Conduct

The person countermanding the original order shall notify, in writing, the person issuing the original order, indicating the action taken and the reason.

#### 320.3.2 SUPERVISOR RESPONSIBILITIES

Supervisors and managers are required to follow all policies and procedures and may be subject to discipline for:

- (a) Failure to be reasonably aware of the performance of their subordinates or to provide appropriate guidance and control.
- (b) Failure to promptly and fully report any known misconduct of a member to his/her immediate supervisor or to document such misconduct appropriately or as required by policy.
- (c) Directing a subordinate to violate a policy or directive, acquiesce to such a violation, or are indifferent to any such violation by a subordinate.
- (d) The unequal or disparate exercise of authority on the part of a supervisor toward any member for malicious or other improper purpose.

#### 320.4 GENERAL STANDARDS

Members shall conduct themselves, whether on- or off-duty, in accordance with the United States and Colorado constitutions and all applicable laws, ordinances, and rules enacted or established pursuant to legal authority.

Members shall familiarize themselves with policies and procedures and are responsible for compliance with each. Members should seek clarification and guidance from supervisors in the event of any perceived ambiguity or uncertainty.

Discipline may be initiated for any good cause. It is not mandatory that a specific policy or rule violation be cited to sustain discipline. This policy is not intended to cover every possible type of misconduct.

## 320.5 CAUSES FOR DISCIPLINE

The following are illustrative of causes for disciplinary action. This list is not intended to cover every possible type of misconduct and does not preclude the recommendation of disciplinary action for violation of other rules, standards, ethics and specific action or inaction that is detrimental to efficient office service.

#### 320.5.1 LAWS, RULES AND ORDERS

- (a) Violation of, or ordering or instructing a subordinate to violate any policy, procedure, rule, order, directive, requirement or failure to follow instructions contained in office or County manuals.
- (b) Disobedience of any legal directive or order issued by any office member of a higher rank.
- (c) Violation of federal, state, local or administrative laws, rules or regulations.

#### 320.5.2 ETHICS

- (a) Using or disclosing one's status as a member of the Mesa County Sheriff's Office in any way that could reasonably be perceived as an attempt to gain influence or authority for non-office business or activity.
- (b) The wrongful or unlawful exercise of authority on the part of any member for malicious purpose, personal gain, willful deceit, or any other improper purpose.
- (c) The receipt or acceptance of a reward, fee, discount, gift, subscription, favor, gratuity, or promise from any person for service incident to the performance of the member's duties (lawful subpoena fees and authorized work permits excepted).
- (d) Acceptance of a reward, fee, discount, gift, subscription, favor, gratuity, or promise contrary to the rules of this office and/or the laws of the state.
- (e) Offer of a bribe or gratuity.
- (f) Misappropriation or misuse of public funds, property, personnel, or services.
- (g) Any other failure to abide by the standards of ethical conduct.

# 320.5.3 DISCRIMINATION, OPPRESSION, OR FAVORITISM

Unless required by law or policy, discriminating against, oppressing, or providing favoritism to any person because of actual or perceived characteristics such as race, ethnicity, national origin, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, age, disability, economic status, cultural group, veteran status, marital status, and any other classification or status protected by law, or intentionally denying or impeding another in the exercise or enjoyment of any right, privilege, power, or immunity, knowing the conduct is unlawful.

#### 320.5.4 RELATIONSHIPS

- (a) Unwelcome solicitation of a personal or sexual relationship while on-duty or through the use of one's official capacity.
- (b) Engaging in on-duty sexual activity including, but not limited to, sexual intercourse, excessive displays of public affection or other sexual contact.
- (c) Establishing or maintaining an inappropriate personal or financial relationship, as a result of an investigation, with a known victim, witness, suspect or defendant while a case is being investigated or prosecuted, or as a direct result of any official contact.
- (d) Associating with or joining a criminal gang, organized crime and/or criminal syndicate when the member knows or reasonably should know of the criminal nature of the organization. This includes any organization involved in a definable criminal activity or enterprise, except as specifically directed and authorized by this office.
- (e) Associating on a personal, rather than official basis with persons who demonstrate recurring involvement in serious violations of state or federal laws after the member knows, or reasonably should know of such criminal activities, except as specifically directed and authorized by this office.

#### 320.5.5 ATTENDANCE

- (a) Leaving the job to which the member is assigned during duty hours without reasonable excuse and proper permission and approval.
- (b) Unexcused or unauthorized absence or tardiness.
- (c) Excessive absenteeism or abuse of leave privileges.
- (d) Failure to report to work or to the place of assignment at the time specified and fully prepared to perform duties without reasonable excuse.

# 320.5.6 UNAUTHORIZED ACCESS, DISCLOSURE, OR USE

- (a) Unauthorized and inappropriate intentional release of confidential or protected information, materials, data, forms, or reports obtained as a result of the member's position with this office.
- (b) Disclosing to any unauthorized person any active investigation information.
- (c) The use of any information, photograph, video, or other recording obtained or accessed as a result of employment or appointment to this office for personal or financial gain or without the express authorization of the Sheriff or the authorized designee.
- (d) Loaning, selling, allowing unauthorized use, giving away, or appropriating any office property for personal use, personal gain, or any other improper or unauthorized use or purpose.
- (e) Using office resources in association with any portion of an independent civil action. These resources include but are not limited to personnel, vehicles, equipment, and non-subpoenaed records.

# 320.5.7 EFFICIENCY

- (a) Neglect of duty.
- (b) Unsatisfactory work performance including but not limited to failure, incompetence, inefficiency, or delay in performing and/or carrying out proper orders, work assignments, or the instructions of supervisors without a reasonable and bona fide excuse.
- (c) Concealing, attempting to conceal, removing, or destroying defective or incompetent work.
- (d) Unauthorized sleeping during on-duty time or assignments.
- (e) Failure to notify the Office within 24 hours of any change in residence address or contact numbers.
- (f) Failure to notify the Human Resources Department of changes in relevant personal information (e.g., information associated with benefits determination) in a timely fashion.

#### 320.5.8 PERFORMANCE

- (a) Failure to disclose or misrepresenting material facts, or making any false or misleading statement on any application, examination form, or other official document, report or form, or during the course of any work-related investigation.
- (b) The falsification of any work-related records, making misleading entries or statements with the intent to deceive or the willful and unauthorized removal, alteration, destruction and/or mutilation of any office record, public record, book, paper or document.
- (c) Failure to participate in, or giving false or misleading statements, or misrepresenting or omitting material information to a supervisor or other person in a position of authority, in connection with any investigation or in the reporting of any office-related business.
- (d) Being untruthful or knowingly making false, misleading or malicious statements that are reasonably calculated to harm the reputation, authority or official standing of this office or its members.
- (e) Disparaging remarks or conduct concerning duly constituted authority to the extent that such conduct disrupts the efficiency of this office or subverts the good order, efficiency and discipline of this office or that would tend to discredit any of its members.
- (f) Unlawful gambling or unlawful betting at any time or any place. Legal gambling or betting under any of the following conditions:
  - 1. While on office premises.
  - 2. At any work site, while on-duty or while in uniform, or while using any office equipment or system.
  - Gambling activity undertaken as part of a deputy's official duties and with the express knowledge and permission of a direct supervisor is exempt from this prohibition.
- (g) Improper political activity including:
  - (a) Unauthorized attendance while on-duty at official legislative or political sessions.
  - (b) Solicitations, speeches or distribution of campaign literature for or against any political candidate or position while on-duty or, on office property except as expressly authorized by County policy or the Sheriff.
- (h) Engaging in political activities during assigned working hours except as expressly authorized by County policy, or the Sheriff.
- (i) Any act on- or off-duty that brings discredit to this office.

## 320.5.9 CONDUCT

(a) Failure of any member to promptly and fully report activities on his/her part or the part of any other member where such activities resulted in contact with any other law enforcement agency or that may result in criminal prosecution or discipline under this policy.

- (b) Unreasonable and unwarranted force to a person encountered or a person under arrest.
- (c) Exceeding lawful peace officer powers by unreasonable, unlawful or excessive conduct.
- (d) Unauthorized or unlawful fighting, threatening or attempting to inflict unlawful bodily harm on another.
- (e) Engaging in horseplay that reasonably could result in injury or property damage.
- (f) Discourteous, disrespectful or discriminatory treatment of any member of the public or any member of this office or the County.
- (g) Use of obscene, indecent, profane or derogatory language while on-duty or in uniform.
- (h) Criminal, dishonest, or disgraceful conduct, whether on- or off-duty, that adversely affects the member's relationship with this office.
- (i) Unauthorized possession of, loss of, or damage to office property or the property of others, or endangering it through carelessness or maliciousness.
- (j) Attempted or actual theft of office property; misappropriation or misuse of public funds, property, personnel or the services or property of others; unauthorized removal or possession of office property or the property of another person.
- (k) Activity that is incompatible with a member's conditions of employment or appointment as established by law or that violates a provision of any collective bargaining agreement or contract to include fraud in securing the appointment or hire.
- (I) Initiating any civil action for recovery of any damages or injuries incurred in the course and scope of employment or appointment without first notifying the Sheriff of such action.
- (m) Any other on- or off-duty conduct which any member knows or reasonably should know is unbecoming a member of this office, is contrary to good order, efficiency or morale, or tends to reflect unfavorably upon this office or its members.

# 320.5.10 SAFETY

- (a) Failure to observe or violating office safety standards or safe working practices.
- (b) Failure to maintain current licenses or certifications required for the assignment or position (e.g., driver's license, first aid).
- (c) Failure to maintain good physical condition sufficient to adequately and safely perform law enforcement duties.
- (d) Unsafe firearm or other dangerous weapon handling to include loading or unloading firearms in an unsafe manner, either on- or off-duty.
- (e) Carrying, while on the premises of the work place, any firearm or other lethal weapon that is not authorized by the member's appointing authority.
- (f) Unsafe or improper driving habits or actions in the course of employment or appointment.

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- (g) Any personal action contributing to a preventable traffic accident.
- (h) Concealing or knowingly failing to report any on-the-job or work-related disease, injury or death as soon as practicable but no later than 24 hours (CRS § 8-43-102).

# 320.5.11 INTOXICANTS

- (a) Reporting for work or being at work while intoxicated or when the member's ability to perform assigned duties is impaired due to the use of alcohol, medication or drugs, whether legal, prescribed or illegal.
- (b) Possession or use of alcohol at any work site or while on-duty, except as authorized in the performance of an official assignment. A member who is authorized to consume alcohol is not permitted to do so to such a degree that it may impair on-duty performance.
- (c) Unauthorized possession, use of, or attempting to bring a controlled substance, illegal drug or non-prescribed medication to any work site.

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# **Use of Force**

# 300.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

This policy provides guidelines on the reasonable use of force. While there is no way to specify the exact amount or type of reasonable force to be applied in any situation, every member of this office is expected to use these guidelines to make such decisions in a professional, impartial, and reasonable manner.

In addition to those methods, techniques, and tools set forth below, the guidelines for the reasonable application of force contained in this policy shall apply to all policies addressing the potential use of force, including but not limited to the Control Devices and Techniques and Conducted Energy Device policies.

#### 300.1.1 DEFINITIONS

Definitions related to this policy include:

**Deadly force** - Force reasonably anticipated and intended to create a substantial likelihood of causing death or very serious injury.

**Feasible** - Reasonably capable of being done or carried out under the circumstances to successfully achieve the arrest or lawful objective without increasing risk to the deputy or another person.

**Force** - The application of physical techniques or tactics, chemical agents or weapons to another person. It is not a use of force when a person allows him/herself to be searched, escorted, handcuffed, or restrained.

**Imminent** - Ready to take place; impending. Note that imminent does not mean immediate or instantaneous.

**Serious bodily injury** - An injury that presents a substantial risk of death, a substantial risk of serious permanent disfigurement, a substantial risk of protracted loss or impairment of the function of any part or organ of the body, or breaks, fractures, or burns of the second or third degree.

**Totality of the circumstances** - All facts and circumstances known to the deputy at the time, taken as a whole, including the conduct of the deputy and the subject leading up to the use of force.

#### 300.2 POLICY

The use of force by law enforcement personnel is a matter of critical concern, both to the public and to the law enforcement community. Deputies are involved on a daily basis in numerous and varied interactions and, when warranted, may use reasonable force in carrying out their duties.

Deputies must have an understanding of, and true appreciation for, their authority and limitations. This is especially true with respect to overcoming resistance while engaged in the performance of law enforcement duties.

# Use of Force

The Office recognizes and respects the value of all human life and dignity without prejudice to anyone. Vesting deputies with the authority to use reasonable force and to protect the public welfare requires monitoring, evaluation and a careful balancing of all interests.

# 300.2.1 DUTY TO INTERVENE AND REPORT

Any deputy present and observing another law enforcement officer or a member using force that is clearly beyond that which is objectively reasonable under the circumstances shall, when in a position to do so, intervene to prevent the use of unreasonable force.

Any deputy who observes another law enforcement officer or a member use force that is potentially beyond that which is objectively reasonable under the circumstances should report these observations to a supervisor as soon as feasible.

# 300.2.2 ADDITIONAL INTERVENTION AND REPORTING

A deputy shall also intervene to prevent or stop another peace officer from using physical force that exceeds the degree of force permitted by CRS § 18-1-707.

An on-duty deputy who witnesses another peace officer using force in excess of that permitted by CRS § 18-1-707 shall report such use of force in writing to the deputy's immediate supervisor. Such report shall be within 10 days of the occurrence and include the date, time, and place of the occurrence; the identities, if known, and description of the participants; a description of the events and the force used; and must be included with all other reports of the incident (CRS § 18-8-802).

A deputy shall intervene to prevent or stop another peace officer from using or directing the use of ketamine to effect an arrest, detention, restraint, transport, or punishment; to prevent the escape from custody; or to facilitate ease and convenience in the law enforcement encounter and report the intervention as required by CRS § 18-8-805 and 4 CCR 901-1:17.

#### 300.2.3 PERSPECTIVE

When observing or reporting force used by a law enforcement officer, each deputy should take into account the totality of the circumstances and the possibility that other law enforcement officers may have additional information regarding the threat posed by the subject.

#### 300.3 USE OF FORCE

Deputies shall use only that amount of force that reasonably appears necessary given the facts and circumstances perceived by the deputy at the time of the event to accomplish a legitimate law enforcement purpose.

The reasonableness of force will be judged from the perspective of a reasonable deputy on the scene at the time of the incident. Any evaluation of reasonableness must allow for the fact that deputies are often forced to make split-second decisions about the amount of force that reasonably appears necessary in a particular situation, with limited information and in circumstances that are tense, uncertain, and rapidly evolving.

Given that no policy can realistically predict every possible situation a deputy might encounter, deputies are entrusted to use well-reasoned discretion in determining the appropriate use of force in each incident.

It is also recognized that circumstances may arise in which deputies reasonably believe that it would be impractical or ineffective to use any of the tools, weapons, or methods provided by this office. Deputies may find it more effective or reasonable to improvise their response to rapidly unfolding conditions that they are confronting. In such circumstances, the use of any improvised device or method must nonetheless be reasonable and utilized only to the degree that reasonably appears necessary to accomplish a legitimate law enforcement purpose.

While the ultimate objective of every law enforcement encounter is to avoid or minimize injury, nothing in this policy requires a deputy to retreat or be exposed to possible physical injury before applying reasonable force.

# 300.3.1 USE OF FORCE TO EFFECT AN ARREST

A deputy should apply nonviolent means, when possible, and may use physical force only if nonviolent means would be ineffective to effect an arrest, prevent an escape, or prevent an imminent threat of injury to deputies or others (CRS § 18-1-707).

Deputies should only use that degree of force consistent with the minimization of injury to others (CRS § 18-1-707).

Deputies shall not apply force in excess of the force permitted by CRS § 18-1-707 to a person who has been rendered incapable of resisting arrest (CRS § 18-8-803).

## 300.3.2 FACTORS USED TO DETERMINE THE REASONABLENESS OF FORCE

When determining whether to apply force and evaluating whether a deputy has used reasonable force, a number of factors should be taken into consideration, as time and circumstances permit. These factors include but are not limited to:

- (a) Immediacy and severity of the threat to deputies or others.
- (b) The conduct of the individual being confronted, as reasonably perceived by the deputy at the time.
- (c) Deputy/subject factors (e.g., age, size, relative strength, skill level, injuries sustained, level of exhaustion or fatigue, the number of deputies available vs. subjects).
- (d) The effects of suspected drug or alcohol use.
- (e) The individual's mental state or capacity.
- (f) The individual's ability to understand and comply with deputy commands.
- (g) Proximity of weapons or dangerous improvised devices.
- (h) The degree to which the individual has been effectively restrained and his/her ability to resist despite being restrained.
- (i) The availability of other reasonable and feasible options and their possible effectiveness.

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- Seriousness of the suspected offense or reason for contact with the individual.
- (k) Training and experience of the deputy.
- (I) Potential for injury to deputies, suspects and others.
- (m) Whether the individual appears to be resisting, attempting to evade arrest by flight, or is attacking the deputy.
- (n) The risk and reasonably foreseeable consequences of escape.
- (o) The apparent need for immediate control of the individual or a prompt resolution of the situation.
- (p) Whether the conduct of the individual being confronted no longer reasonably appears to pose an imminent threat to the deputy or others.
- (q) Prior contacts with the individual or awareness of any propensity for violence.
- (r) Any other exigent circumstances.

#### 300.3.3 PAIN COMPLIANCE TECHNIQUES

Pain compliance techniques may be effective in controlling a physically or actively resisting individual. Deputies may only apply those pain compliance techniques for which they have successfully completed office-approved training. Deputies utilizing any pain compliance technique should consider:

- (a) The degree to which the application of the technique may be controlled given the level of resistance.
- (b) Whether the individual can comply with the direction or orders of the deputy.
- (c) Whether the individual has been given sufficient opportunity to comply.

The application of any pain compliance technique shall be discontinued once the deputy determines that compliance has been achieved.

# 300.3.4 USE OF FORCE TO SEIZE EVIDENCE

In general, deputies may use reasonable force to lawfully seize evidence and to prevent the destruction of evidence. However, deputies are discouraged from using force solely to prevent a person from swallowing evidence or contraband. In the instance when force is used, deputies should not intentionally use any technique that restricts blood flow to the head, restricts respiration or which creates a reasonable likelihood that blood flow to the head or respiration would be restricted. Deputies are encouraged to use techniques and methods taught by the Mesa County Sheriff's Office for this specific purpose.

# 300.3.5 ALTERNATIVE TACTICS - DE-ESCALATION

When circumstances reasonably permit, deputies should use non-violent strategies and techniques to decrease the intensity of a situation, improve decision-making, improve communication, reduce the need for force, and increase voluntary compliance (e.g., summoning additional resources, formulating a plan, attempting verbal persuasion).

## 300.3.6 PROHIBITION ON CHOKEHOLDS

A deputy is prohibited from using a chokehold upon another person. A chokehold is defined as a method by which a person applies sufficient pressure to a person to make breathing difficult or impossible. It also includes pressure to stop the flow of blood to the brain via the carotid arteries (CRS § 18-1-707).

#### 300.4 DEADLY FORCE APPLICATIONS

When reasonable, the deputy shall, prior to the use of deadly force, make efforts to identify themself as a peace officer and to warn that deadly force may be used, unless the deputy has objectively reasonable grounds to believe the person is aware of those facts or that doing so would unduly place deputies or other persons at risk of injury or death (CRS § 18-1-707).

Use of deadly force is justified in the following circumstances involving imminent threat or imminent risk:

- (a) A deputy may use deadly force to protect themself or others from what the deputy reasonably believes is an imminent threat of death or serious bodily injury.
- (b) A deputy may use deadly force to stop a fleeing subject when the deputy has probable cause to believe that the individual has committed, or intends to commit, a felony involving the infliction or threatened infliction of serious bodily injury or death, and the deputy reasonably believes that there is an imminent risk of serious bodily injury or death to any other person if the individual is not immediately apprehended. Under such circumstances, a verbal warning should precede the use of deadly force, where feasible.

However, a deputy should not use deadly force against a person whose actions are a threat solely to themself or property.

Imminent does not mean immediate or instantaneous. An imminent danger may exist even if the suspect is not at that very moment pointing a weapon at someone. For example, an imminent danger may exist if a deputy reasonably believes that the individual has a weapon or is attempting to access one and intends to use it against the deputy or another person. An imminent danger may also exist if the individual is capable of causing serious bodily injury or death without a weapon, and the deputy believes the individual intends to do so.

#### 300.4.1 MOVING VEHICLES

Shots fired at or from a moving vehicle are rarely effective and involve considerations and risks in addition to the justification for the use of deadly force.

When feasible, deputies should take reasonable steps to move out of the path of an approaching vehicle instead of discharging their firearm at the vehicle or any of its occupants. A deputy should only discharge a firearm at a moving vehicle or its occupants when the deputy reasonably believes there are no other reasonable means available to avert the imminent threat of the vehicle, or if deadly force other than the vehicle is directed at the deputy or others.

Deputies should not shoot at any part of a vehicle in an attempt to disable the vehicle.

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#### 300.5 REPORTING THE USE OF FORCE

Any use of force by a member of this office shall be documented promptly, completely and accurately in their case report, in a use of force report depending on the nature of the incident and type of force used. The deputy should articulate the factors perceived and why he/she believed the use of force was reasonable under the circumstances. To collect data for purposes of training, resource allocation, analysis and related purposes, the Office may require the completion of additional report forms, as specified in office policy, procedure or law.

#### 300.5.1 NOTIFICATIONS TO SUPERVISORS

Supervisory notification shall be made as soon as practicable following the application of force in any of the following circumstances:

- (a) The application caused a visible injury.
- (b) The application would lead a reasonable deputy to conclude that the individual may have experienced more than momentary discomfort.
- (c) The individual subjected to the force complained of injury or continuing pain.
- (d) The individual indicates intent to pursue litigation.
- (e) Any application of the conducted energy device or control device.
- (f) Any application of a restraint device other than handcuffs, shackles, or belly chains.
- (g) The individual subjected to the force was rendered unconscious.
- (h) An individual was struck or kicked.
- (i) An individual alleges unreasonable force was used or that any of the above has occurred.

#### 300.5.2 REPORTING TO COLORADO DIVISION OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE

Statistical data regarding all qualifying incidents shall be reported to the Colorado Division of Criminal Justice as required by CRS § 24-31-903 (see the Records Section Procedures Policy). For the purposes of this section, a qualifying incident means any (CRS § 24-31-903):

- (a) Incident involving the use of force by a deputy that results in death or serious bodily injury.
- (b) Incident involving the use of force by a deputy that involved the use of a weapon.
- (c) Contact with the public conducted by deputies, including entries into a residence.
- (d) Instance of unannounced entry into a residence.

# 300.6 MEDICAL CONSIDERATIONS

Once it is reasonably safe to do so, medical assistance shall be obtained for any person who exhibits signs of physical distress, has sustained visible injury, expresses a complaint of injury or continuing pain, or was rendered unconscious. Any individual exhibiting signs of physical distress after an encounter should be continuously monitored until he/she can be medically assessed.

Individuals should not be placed on their stomachs for an extended period, as this could impair their ability to breathe.

Based upon the deputy's initial assessment of the nature and extent of the individual's injuries, medical assistance may consist of examination by an emergency medical services provider or medical personnel at a hospital or jail. If any such individual refuses medical attention, such a refusal shall be fully documented in related reports and, whenever practicable, should be witnessed by another deputy and/or medical personnel. If a recording is made of the contact or an interview with the individual, any refusal should be included in the recording, if possible.

The on-scene supervisor or, if the on-scene supervisor is not available, the primary handling deputy shall ensure that any person providing medical care or receiving custody of a person following any use of force is informed that the person was subjected to force. This notification shall include a description of the force used and any other circumstances the deputy reasonably believes would be potential safety or medical risks to the subject (e.g., prolonged struggle, extreme agitation, impaired respiration).

Individuals who exhibit extreme agitation, violent irrational behavior accompanied by profuse sweating, extraordinary strength beyond their physical characteristics, and imperviousness to pain, or who require a protracted physical encounter with multiple deputies to be brought under control, may be at an increased risk of sudden death. Calls involving these persons should be considered medical emergencies. Deputies who reasonably suspect a medical emergency should request medical assistance as soon as practicable and have medical personnel stage away.

See the Medical Aid and Response Policy for additional guidelines.

#### 300.7 SUPERVISOR RESPONSIBILITIES

A supervisor should respond to a reported application of force resulting in visible injury, if reasonably available. When a supervisor is able to respond to an incident in which there has been a reported application of force, the supervisor is expected to:

- (a) Obtain the basic facts from the involved deputies. Absent an allegation of misconduct or excessive force, this will be considered a routine contact in the normal course of duties.
- (b) Ensure that any injured parties are examined and treated.
- (c) When possible, separately obtain a recorded interview with the individual upon whom force was applied. If this interview is conducted without the individual having voluntarily waived his/her *Miranda* rights, the following shall apply:
  - 1. The content of the interview should not be summarized or included in any related criminal charges.
  - The fact that a recorded interview was conducted should be documented in a property or other report.
  - 3. The recording of the interview should be distinctly marked for retention until all potential for civil litigation has expired.

- (d) Once any initial medical assessment has been completed or first aid has been rendered, ensure that photographs have been taken of any areas involving visible injury or complaint of pain, as well as overall photographs of uninjured areas.
  - 1. These photographs should be retained until all potential for civil litigation has expired.
- (e) Identify any witnesses not already included in related reports.
- (f) Review and approve all related reports.
- (g) Determine if there is any indication that the individual may pursue civil litigation.
  - 1. If there is an indication of potential civil litigation, the supervisor should complete and route a notification of a potential claim through the appropriate channels.
- (h) Evaluate the circumstances surrounding the incident and initiate an administrative investigation if there is a question of policy noncompliance or if for any reason further investigation may be appropriate.

In the event that a supervisor is unable to respond to the scene of an incident involving the reported application of force, the supervisor is still expected to complete as many of the above items as circumstances permit.

#### 300.7.1 PATROL LIEUTENANT RESPONSIBILITY

The Patrol Lieutenant shall review each use of force by any personnel within his/her command to ensure compliance with this policy and to address any training issues.

## 300.8 TRAINING

Deputies will receive periodic training on this policy and demonstrate their knowledge and understanding.

Subject to available resources, deputies should receive periodic training on:

- (a) Guidelines regarding vulnerable populations, including but not limited to children, elderly, pregnant persons, and individuals with physical, mental, or intellectual disabilities.
- (b) De-escalation tactics, including alternatives to force.

# 300.8.1 TRAINING REQUIREMENTS

Training shall include:

- (a) Legal updates.
- (b) De-escalation tactics, including alternatives to force.
- (c) The duty to intervene.
- (d) The duty to request and/or render medical aid.
- (e) Warning shots (see the Firearms Policy).
- (f) All other subjects covered in this policy (e.g., use of deadly force, chokeholds, discharge of a firearm at or from a moving vehicle, verbal warnings).

# Use of Force

# 300.9 USE OF FORCE ANALYSIS

At least annually, the Operations Division Captain should prepare an analysis report on use of force incidents. The report should be submitted to the Sheriff. The report should not contain the names of deputies, suspects or case numbers, and should include:

- (a) The identification of any trends in the use of force by members.
- (b) Training needs recommendations.
- (c) Equipment needs recommendations.
- (d) Policy revision recommendations.

# **Use of Force Review**

# 301.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

This policy establishes a process for the Mesa County Sheriff's Office to review the use of force by its employees.

This review process shall be in addition to any other review or investigation that may be conducted by any outside or multi-agency entity having jurisdiction over the investigation or evaluation of the use of deadly force.

#### **301.2 POLICY**

The Mesa County Sheriff's Office will objectively evaluate the use of force by its members to ensure that their authority is used lawfully, appropriately and is consistent with training and policy.

#### 301.3 REMOVAL FROM LINE DUTY ASSIGNMENT

Generally, whenever an employee's actions or use of force in an official capacity, or while using office equipment, results in death or very serious injury to another, that employee will be placed on administrative leave pending an internal review. The Sheriff may exercise discretion and choose not to place an employee on administrative leave in any case.

# 301.4 USE OF FORCE REPORTING

All use of force incidents should be documented pursuant to policy 300.5 of this manual

Additionally a Blue Team use of force report should be completed whenever the use of force involves the following:

- (a) The use of force resulted in serious bodily injury or injury requiring hospital level treatment to the suspect.
- (b) Use of a baton.
- (c) Use or a conducted energy device (Taser) even if the use was not effective.
- (d) Use of chemical control device such as Oleoresin Capsicum (OC) or any form of Tear Gas.
- (e) Use kinetic energy projectile weapon.

Blue Team use of force reports will be reviewed at all levels of the submitting employees chain of command up to the Division Captain to ensure the level of force used was consistent with policy, state law, and federal law prior to submitting the final report to Professional Standards Unit.

#### 301.5 INCIDENT REVIEW

Upon the request of the Sheriff, Undersheriff, or Captain the Professional Standards Unit will investigate and review the circumstances surrounding every discharge of a firearm, whether the employee was on or off duty, excluding training, recreational use, or when appropriately used to end the suffering of a dying animal.

# Use of Force Review

The Division Captain may request the Professional Standards Unit to investigate the circumstances surrounding any use of force incident.

The involved employee's Division Captain or supervisor will ensure all relevant reports, documents and materials are available for consideration for the Professional Standards Unit's investigation.

#### 301.5.1 RESPONSIBILITIES OF THOSE CONDUCTING THE INVESTIGATION

The Professional Standards Unit is empowered to conduct an administrative review and inquiry into the circumstances of an incident.

The Professional Standards Unit may request further investigation, request reports be submitted for their review, call persons to present information and request the involved employee to appear. The involved employee will be notified of the investigation and may choose to have a representative through all phases of the review process.

The Professional Standards Unitdoes not have the authority to recommend discipline.

The Sheriff will determine whether the Professional Standards Unit should delay its review until after completion of any criminal investigation, review by any prosecutorial body, filing of criminal charges the decision not to file criminal charges, or any other action. The Professional Standards Unit should be provided all relevant available material from these proceedings for their consideration.

The review shall be based upon those facts which were reasonably believed or known by the deputy at the time of the incident, applying any legal requirements, office policies, procedures and approved training to those facts. Facts later discovered but unknown to the deputy at the time shall neither justify nor call into question a deputy's decision regarding the use of force.

Any questioning of the involved employee conducted by the Professional Standards Unitwill be in accordance with the office's disciplinary procedures, the Personnel Complaints Policy, and any applicable state or federal law.

The Professional Standards Unit shall make one of the following recommended findings:

- (a) The employee's actions were within office policy and procedure.
- (b) The employee's actions were in violation of office policy and procedure.

The Sheriff shall review the recommendation, make a final determination as to whether the employee's actions were within policy and procedure and will determine whether any additional actions, investigations or reviews are appropriate. The Sheriff's final findings will be forwarded to the involved employee's Division Captain for review and appropriate action. If the Sheriff concludes that discipline should be considered, a disciplinary process will be initiated.

At the conclusion of any additional reviews, copies of all relevant reports and information will be filed with the Sheriff.

This letter is in response to your request for criminal justice records submitted to us on May 1st, 2024. In that request, you asked for any internal information on prior complaints, corrective actions, and disciplinary records for Deputy Michael Hand in the last 9 years.

In accordance with Mesa County Sheriff's Office Policy 803; Records Maintenance and Release - Records related to completed internal investigations (including any appeals) into the alleged misconduct of an in-uniform or on-duty deputy, when involving a member of the public that occurred after April 12, 2019, shall be made available for inspection as required by CRS § 24-72-303.

CRS § 24-72-303 states in part that the custodian of records may first provide the requester with a summary of the investigation file.

Based on the above, please see the following summaries of all applicable material regarding your request.

# I.A. Investigation Summary - Deputy Michael Hand

<u>Subject Employee</u> - Michael Hand, Deputy Sheriff

<u>Date of Request</u> - 05/01/2024

<u>Incident(s)</u> – Guardian Tracking: # 8855

**Guardian Tracking: #11231** 

**Guardian Tracking:** # 8855 – On 01/27/22 Deputy Hand conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle which was not displaying any license plates. The driver provided paperwork which showed the vehicle had just been purchased the day prior. Per the provided paperwork, coupled with the Colorado Revised Statue pertaining to this situation (CRS: 42-3-115), the driver of the vehicle was well within the law by driving without a license plate for up to 36 days. However, Deputy Hand still issued the driver a ticket. The driver of the vehicle later filed a complaint. Once Deputy Hand's supervisor was made aware of the complaint / incident, he conducted an investigation and found that Deputy Hand was lacking knowledge of the specific violation he had issued the ticket for. Ultimately, the ticket was moved from the system and the driver was contacted and notified to disregard the ticket. Deputy Hand received verbal counseling for this complaint / issue.

Guardian Tracking: # 11231 – On 09/08/23 the MCSO received a call from a parent wishing to file a complaint on an MCSO Sergeant and Deputy Hand. The parent said the night prior, her child was at a high school football game being held at Stocker Stadium. During the game, a fight occurred in the parking lot and Deputies proceeded to the area to break up the fight and investigate. While doing so, the parent explained that a cell phone video showed the MCSO Sergeant grabbing their child by the hair. Ultimately, body-worn camera footage was searched and it was found that the MCSO Sergeant never grabbed anyone's hair. Subsequently, this footage was shown to the parent simply to help set them at ease. The same parent then advised of wishing to file a complaint on Deputy Hand because he had placed their same child in handcuffs during a different incident that same night. An investigation was conducted and it was found that Deputy Hand had in fact placed this parent's child in handcuffs. This parent's child had been asked to leave the property several times but continued to argue and remain on scene. While being

escorted out of the Stocker Stadium area, this parent's child made an unknown comment to Deputy Hand and stopped walking out of the facility. At that point, Deputy Hand proceeded to place the child in handcuffs and detain the child for trespassing as they were failing to leave the facility. Ultimately, based on the totality of the circumstances surrounding the case and the child's actions, there was probable cause to arrest and charge the child with trespassing, however the child was never charged; rather they were escorted off the premises and their parents were called to come pick them up. The complaint was ultimately unfounded, however, Deputy Hand received verbal counseling and training regarding emotional intelligence, and understanding the need for application of force and/or handcuffs.

This document incorporates all current TASER energy weapon warnings by reference. This document is effective March 1, 2023, and supersedes all prior revisions.

## IMPORTANT SAFETY AND HEALTHINFORMATION

Read, understand, and follow all current instructions, warnings, and relevant TASER training materials before participating in TASER energy weapon training or experiencing a energy weapon exposure. Failure to do so could increase the risk of death or serious injury to the trainee, operator, force recipient, instructor, participants or others. Always follow all current instructions, warnings, and TASER training materials to minimize energy weapon risks.

## TRAINING ENERGY WEAPON EXPOSURES

Voluntary. Axon does <u>not</u> require an energy weapon exposure as a condition for Instructor or Operator Certification. It is up to each agency to determine whether its instructors and operators experience an energy weapon exposure as part of training. If energy weapon exposures are performed, they must be limited to a single exposure not exceeding 5 seconds and performed in accordance with Axon's guidelines and by a Certified TASER Instructor.<sup>1</sup>

**Probe Deployments to Back Only.** Cartridge deployed probes must be to the back of the torso or back of the legs only.

Spotters. All persons taking an energy weapon exposure must be properly supported by spotters to prevent falls unless lying down on a mat. Each spotter must hold the person and support the arm under the armpit to prevent arm or shoulder injuries. Eye Protection. Eye protection is required for the energy weapon operator, observers, spotters and the person being exposed to any probe deployment during ALL times.

## SAFETY INFORMATION: ENERGY WEAPON RISKS AND RISK AVOIDANCE

Muscle Contraction or Strain-Related Injury. Energy weapons in probe-deployment mode can cause muscle contractions that may result in injury, including bone fractures. Energy weapons in probe-deployment mode can cause muscle contractions resulting in injuries similar to those from physical exertion, athletics, or sports, including hernia rupture, dislocation, tear, or other injury to soft tissue, organ, muscle, tendon, ligament, cartilage, disc, nerve, bone, or joint; or injury or damage associated with or to orthopedic or other hardware. Fractures to bone, including compression fracture to vertebrae, may occur. These injuries may be more serious and more likely to occur in people with pre-existing injuries, orthopedic hardware, conditions or special susceptibilities, including pregnancy; low bone density; spinal injury; or previous muscle, disc, ligament, joint, bone, or tendon damage or surgery. Such injuries may also occur in drive-stun applications or when a person reacts to the energy weapon deployment by making a rapid or unexpected movement. AWARNING Secondary Injury. The loss of control resulting from an energy weapon exposure may result in injuries due to a fall or other uncontrolled movement. When possible, avoid using an energy weapon when secondary injuries are likely Seizure. Repetitive stimuli (e.g., flashing light or electrical stimuli) can induce seizure in some people, which may result in death or serious injury. This risk may be increased in a person with epilepsy, a seizure history, or if electrical stimuli pass through the head. Emotional stress and physical exertion, both likely in incidents involving energy weapons and other uses of force, are reported as seizure-precipitating factors. Fainting. A person may experience an exaggerated response to an energy weapon exposure, or threatened exposure, which may result in fainting or falling. Muscle contraction, incapacitation, or startle response. Energy weapon use may cause loss of control from muscle contraction, incapacitation, or startle response.

**CAMPRING** Cumulative Effects. Energy weapon exposure causes certain effects, including physiologic and metabolic changes, stress, and pain. In some individuals, the risk of death or serious injury may increase with cumulative energy weapon exposure. Repeated, prolonged, or continuous energy weapon applications may contribute to cumulative exhaustion, stress, cardiac, physiologic, metabolic, respiratory, and associated medical risks which could increase the risk of death or

serious injury. Minimize repeated, continuous, or simultaneous exposures. 
Physiologic and Metabolic Effects. Energy weapon use causes physiologic and/or metabolic effects that may increase the risk of death or serious injury. These effects include changes in blood chemistry, blood pressure, respiration, heart rate and rhythm, and adrenaline and stress hormones, among others. In human studies of electrical discharge from a single energy weapon of up to 15 seconds, the effects on acid/base balance, creatine kinase, electrolytes, stress hormones, and vital signs were comparable to or less than changes expected from physical exertion similar to struggling, resistance, fighting, fleeing, or from the application of some other force tools or techniques. Some individuals may be particularly susceptible to the effects of energy weapon use. These susceptible individuals include the elderly, those with heart conditions, asthma or other pulmonary conditions, and people suffering from excited delirium, profound agitation, severe exhaustion, drug intoxication or chronic drug abuse, and/or over-exertion from physical struggle. In a physiologically or metabolically compromised person, any physiologic or metabolic change may cause

**Stress and Pain.** Energy weapon use, anticipation of use, or response to use can cause startle, panic, fear, anger, rage, temporary discomfort, pain, or stress which may be injurious or fatal to some people.

Minimize the number and duration of energy weapon exposures. Most human energy weapon lab testing has not exceeded 15 seconds of energy weapon application, and none has exceeded 45 seconds. Use the shortest duration of energy weapon exposure objectively reasonable to accomplish lawful objectives, and reassess the subject's behavior, reaction, and resistance before initiating or continuing the exposure. If an energy weapon deployment is ineffective in incapacitating a subject or achieving compliance, consider alternative control measures in conjunction with or separate from the energy weapon.

Avoid simultaneous energy weapon exposures. Do not use multiple energy weapons or multiple completed circuits at the same time without justification. Multiple energy weapons or multiple completed circuits at the same time could have cumulative effects and result in increased risks.

Control and restrain immediately. Begin control and restraint procedures, including during energy weapon exposure (cuffing under power), as soon as reasonably safe and practical to minimize energy weapon cumulative effects and the total duration of exertion and stress experienced by the subject.

Avoid touching probes/wires during energy weapon discharge. Controlling and restraining a subject during energy weapon exposure may put the energy weapon operator and those assisting at risk of accidental or unintended shock. Avoid touching the probes and wires and the areas between the probes during the electrical discharge.

heart has a low probability of inducing extra heart beats (cardiac capture). In rare circumstances, cardiac capture could lead to cardiac arrest. When possible, avoid targeting the frontal chest area near the heart to reduce the risk of potential serious injury or death. Cardiac capture may be more likely in children and thin adults because the heart is usually closer to the energy weapon-delivered discharge (the dart-to-heart distance). Serious complications could also arise in those with impaired heart function or in those with an implanted cardiac pacemaker or defibrillator.

Use preferred target areas. The preferred target areas are below the neck areafor back shots and the lower center mass (below chest) for front shots. The preferred target areas increase dart-to-heart distance and reduce cardiac risks. Back shots are preferable to front shots when practicable.

**Avoid sensitive areas.** When practicable, avoid intentionally targeting the energy weapon on sensitive areas of the body such as the face, eyes, head, throat, chest area (area of the heart), breast, groin, genitals, or known pre-existing injury areas.

With an APPM installed, the X2 and X26P can be programmed to stop an energy weapon discharge at 5 seconds even if the operator continues to hold back the trigger, requiring a deliberate action to re-energize the deployed cartridge. The TASER 7 and TASER 10 offer similar options incorporated into the device (independent of the battery pack). Know your model and how it works. Avoid repeated, prolonged, or continuous energy weapon applications when practicable.

Subject may not be fully incapacitated. Even though a subject may be affected by a energy weapon in one part of his body, the subject may maintain full muscle control of other portions of his body. Control and restrain a subject as soon as possible, and be prepared in case the subject is not fully incapacitated.

Subject may recover immediately. A subject receiving an energy weapon discharge may immediately regain physical or cognitive abilities upon cessation of the delivered energy weapon discharge. Control and restrain a subject as soon as possible, and be prepared in case the subject immediately recovers.

**Drive-stun mode is for pain compliance only.** The use of a handheld energy weapon in drive-stun mode is painful, but generally does not cause incapacitation. Drive-stun use may not be effective on emotionally disturbed persons or others who may not respond to pain due to a mind-body disconnect. Avoid using repeated drive-stuns on such individuals if compliance is not achieved.

- 3) If I choose not to continue with a second or third qualification attempt during Block #2, I can stop, get additional practice, and retest the 2<sup>nd</sup> or 3<sup>rd</sup> attempt at another skills test or location. I realize I must pay an additional skills test out fee if I take a time out and additional attempts must be coordinated by POST staff.
- 4) If during any stage of qualification, I incur an unanticipated malfunction, I may be given an "alibi" provided that in the opinion of the SME member overseeing the qualification I made an immediate effort to properly clear the malfunction but was unable to safely do so within the prescribed time limit. The stage may be re-shot at the discretion of the SME member.
- 5) I must test with a semi-automatic pistol which has been inspected for serviceability and safety by a currently certified armorer. I will have a minimum of 75 rounds of new factory loaded ammunition in my possession.
- 6) I MUST ADHERE TO THE 4 FIREARMS SAFETY RULES WHILE DEMONSTRATING, DESCRIBING, OR IN ATTENDANCE AT THE ENTIRE FIREARMS TESTING. ANY VIOLATION OF THESE 4 RULES WILL RESULT IN IMMEDIATE FAILURE OF THE TESTING AND REQUIRE REMOVAL FROM THE TESTING AREA.
